PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Dear Parents & Guardians,

I've been going through a good number of "lasts" in the past few weeks. As you know I am retiring and will be leaving my role as Principal though I might dabble in some support tasks here and there. I have spent the last 35 years surrounded everyday by caring, hardworking, knowledgeable and inspirational colleagues. I've gotta say that I am going to miss this atmosphere. There's a lot of positivity in the world of education.

There are two things I would like to say in my last newsletter message. The first thing that I would like to say is, Thank you, Stony Plain.

I have spent the last 18 years of my career working in this community, eight at Memorial. Schools are a clear reflection of their community. What you have in your community, you will find in your school. Is Stony Plain perfect? No. No place is. But what I have overwhelmingly seen in all three of my schools here has been cheerful, well spoken, respectful, and caring young people who are connected to their community. In my humble opinion, that is who makes up Stony Plain and it has been a pleasure working with your kids. Thank you for sending them to us.

The second thing I would like to suggest is to take care of your teachers. We are a "hurtin" sector at the moment. Kids and families are different since the pandemic and we are still negotiating our way to figure out how to support the dramatic increase in complexity that some families bring to us. Artificial intelligence is about to turn classroom instruction on its head. There are some foundational elements of teaching that have suddenly become invalid. There are going to be huge instructional opportunities coming from this but we are just figuring that out at the moment. Our society as a whole has an increased culture of accountability (which is a good thing) that has led to a notable increased, time consuming requirement for teachers to tend to bureaucratic tasks. Even with all of this, they walk into school each day looking forward to seeing your kids, hearing how their weekend was, finding out about their goals and successes, and supporting them through challenges. Most are coaching or have clubs. They all care deeply about their students and Memorial and are trying their best each day without asking for much. A little support and a spirit of working together goes a long way.

It has been an honor and a privilege to lead such a dedicated and passionate team at Memorial and to witness the incredible growth and achievements of our students. While I am excited for the new adventures that await me, I will always cherish my Memorial memories. I leave with a heart full of gratitude and pride, confident that the future holds great things for all of you.

TORCH TIME



IMPORTANT REMINDERS:

- Monday Torch Time is integrated into class time and therefore, Mondays will run on a full day bell schedule with dismissal continuing to be at 3:20 pm. This changes lunch time on Mondays to 11:25 am 12:25 pm.
- Tuesdays to Fridays will continue to have Torch Time scheduled from 2:45 3:20 pm and lunch will run from 11:05 am 12:05 pm.
- Students and the school are still accountable for the whereabouts of students until the end of the full school day. All students need to be signed up for a Torch Session every Tuesday to Friday through PowerSchool.
- Parents and teachers can also sign up a student for a Torch Session. Students cannot unenroll from those sessions. There is a video below explaining to parents how they can sign their child up for a session.
- If a student is in good standing (meeting the expectations of their teachers, parents, and themselves) and have all of their assignments submitted to a passing level, they may use that time for a personal interest Torch Session (Open Gym, Fitness Training, etc.) or sign up to be Off Campus With Parent Approval. Students are also encouraged to sign up for academic sessions if they wish to improve their marks.

Grads are requested to arrive no later than 1:30 pm and will be required to proceed to the Grad Assembly area (Hall C). Please be advised that backpacks, bags, and outside beverages are prohibited in the Grad Assembly area and are subject to inspection. Once the Ceremony is underway, Hall C will not be monitored by the Edmonton Convention Security Team or Memorial staff to protect personal items. Therefore, any bags brought to the venue must be left with family as Memorial Composite High School and the Edmonton Convention Centre are not responsible for lost or stolen items. Water stations will be available in the Grad Assembly area for the graduates.

Guest Information

All Guests must either have a digital or printed copy of their ticket ready to be scanned for admission. Each scanned ticket is a one time admission.

Restrooms are available inside the venue for your convenience. Out of respect for the graduates and their families once the Ceremony has begun the main doors will be locked and should a guest choose to leave there will be a restricted re-entry policy in effect.

Decarbonize Retreat:

The Environmental Club had a life-changing experience at Decarbonize's 2024 Writer's Retreat. On April 19-21 the club stayed at Camp He Ho Ha in Seba Beach to write a Canadian Youth Climate Manifesto. The manifesto features Canadian youths' concerns, demands, and hopes about the future of climate policy that would be presented to major players in the environmental space, including a member of the Canadian Senate. The event was put on by Decarbonize, which is the "world's largest, multilingual school-based program on climate education, advocacy, art, and action,". Students from Alberta, New Brunswick, and Ontario came for the writing retreat. The club met and shared ideas with students from across the country, forming life-long bonds and life-changing experiences. Members Sage Kuehn and Hanna Wilks presented the paper to a member of the Senate as well as CEOs of other education focused environmental groups. Hanna Wilks also won the "Best Rookie Award" at the retreat!

The club worked hard to conduct research and complete surveys to prepare for writing the paper. Club supervisor Mrs. O'Grady worked tirelessly to ensure the students were able to go, and Mrs. Duncan went with the group to supervise and assist with the group's activities. Besides writing the manifesto, club members designed climate art, met the Latin American Decarbonize branch, received wisdom from Kookum Violet, and participated in group bonding activities. This experience inspired new members with ideas for projects in the years that come.

Care Kits:

The environmental club was given an opportunity this year to create zero waste care kits for the homeless. The club applied for the Young Edmonton Grant from the Edmonton Community Foundation in which they received \$1400 to create the kits. Working with local businesses such as The Local Refillery and Whimsical Vintage Creations, and Jack's Drive In, the club was able to acquire enough materials for 20 care kits. Within the bag, there were refillable bottles of shampoo, body and sunscreen to reduce single use plastics as well as biodegradable menstrual products among other things. During torch time, a few senior members worked with younger students outside of the club to garner interest and show them how the club works. The club is excited to give away the care kits at The Stony Plain Public Library and see some change in and around the town.

He explained how the team used marketing to attract fans to the game of baseball using unique events. It was informative and interesting as we learned the struggles of running a baseball team in a hockey market. The students were given a tour of the stadium and met Randy Gregg while on the tour. Thank you to Steve for his hospitality and time.

On May 23, both Legal Studies classes travelled to the Law Courts in Edmonton to watch live court. The students were able to see two trials involving sexual assault, another involving family law (spousal and child support) and the docket in Indigenous court.

On May 27, two Crown Prosecutors from the Organized Crime section came and spoke to the Legal Studies classes. Thomas O'Leary and Richard Tchir spoke to the classes about their career paths, their experiences, and shared details of how the court system works. Thank you to Thomas and Richard for sharing their time to speak to our classes.

On June 7, the Legal Studies classes will be travelling to the University of Alberta Law Centre to participate in a mock trial involving a second-degree murder case. We are lucky enough to get to use the newly renovated Moot Courtroom. Thank you to Alex Duica and Student Legal Services for making the opportunity a reality for the students."
